



Resource Guide for Operation Field Trip by Dawn Renee Young

Overview

Operation Field Trip follows Millie and her friends on a school field trip to the zoo. Through jokes, friendship, and animal adventures, students learn about empathy, teamwork, and animal facts, all while enjoying Millie's sense of humor.

Learning Objectives

- Identify story elements (characters, setting, plot, problem, solution)
- 2. Practice reading comprehension and recall
- 3. Explore themes of friendship, empathy, and humor
- 4. Learn animal facts and vocabulary
- 5. Engage in creative writing and oral storytelling



Lesson Plan

Pre-Reading Activities

Activate Prior Knowledge

- 1. Ask: "Have you ever been on a field trip? Where did you go? What did you do?"
- Discuss zoo animals that students know and share favorite animal jokes.
- 3. Vocabulary Introduction: Review words such as: exhibit, pride (of lions), zookeeper, chaperone, empathy, joke, and field trip.

During Reading

Chapter 1-2

- 1. Why does Millie love telling jokes? How do her jokes make her friends feel?
- 2. What are Millie and her friends most excited about for the field trip?
- 3. How does Millie prepare for the big day?

Chapter 3-5

- 1. How does Millie help Ming when she forgets her snack?
- 2. What animal facts do you learn from the zookeepers?
- 3. How do the characters react to seeing new animals?

Chapter 6-8

- 1. How does Millie use humor to help her friends feel better?
- 2. What are some animal jokes Millie tells? Which one is your favorite?
- 3. What is special about the giraffe exhibit?

Chapter 9-10

- 1. How do the friends support each other during the trip?
- 2. What does Millie discover about making people laugh?
- 3. How does the story end? How do the characters feel about the end of the school year?



Post Reading Activities

1. Comprehension Check

- Sequence the events of the field trip (students can draw or write).
- Character map: Describe Millie, Ming, and Kera with evidence from the text.

2. Creative Extension

- Joke Booklet: Have students write and illustrate their own animal jokes.
- Field Trip Journal: Write a diary entry as if they were on the field trip.
- Animal Fact Posters: Research one animal from the book and create a fact poster.

3. Social-Emotional Learning

- Discuss how Millie helps her friends using humor.
 When can jokes be helpful? When might they not be?
- Role-play: Practice telling jokes or comforting a friend who feels sad.

4. STEM Connection

- Research an animal from the story (giraffe, elephant, lion, etc.). Present 3 new facts to the class.
- Math: Estimate how long it would take a giraffe to run a certain distance at 60 mph.

Extension Ideas

Author Study: Learn more about Dawn Renee Young and her other books.

Classroom Zoo: Create a classroom display with student-made animal drawings and facts.

Family Connection: Encourage students to share a favorite joke or animal fact at home.

Assessment

- Participation in discussions and activities
- Completion of creative assignments (joke booklet, journal entry, poster)
- Ability to recall and sequence story events
- Demonstration of empathy and teamwork in group activities
